Dear friends,

Loneliness was a widespread problem long before Covid-19 hit. A couple of years ago, the UK even appointed the world's first Minister for Loneliness. But this issue has undoubtedly been exacerbated by the current restrictions on meeting and movement. Many will be struggling as never before.

Of course, it doesn't just affect those who live alone: we should not underestimate the loneliness of living in a difficult marriage or an embittered family. It is quite possible to be lonely without being alone, just as it is possible to be alone without feeling lonely.

What comfort is there for the lonely Christian?

One reason God came to earth as a human was so that, as Jesus Christ, he could experience loneliness. We could point to many possible examples in his life, but it was surely in the run up to his death that Jesus was plunged into his deepest loneliness. First, in the Garden of Gethsemane, Peter, James and John fell asleep in Christ's hour of need – not once but three times. Then, when the soldiers arrived, all of Jesus' disciples abandoned him and fled. Worst of all, the next day, Jesus cried out on the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Why so much loneliness? So that Christians have a God who is with them. Christ took the God-forsakenness we deserve so that we are not God-forsaken for all eternity. Christ was abandoned by God's people so that God's people won't be abandoned by him. Therefore, the LORD says to the Christian, "Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God" (Isaiah 41:10).

Why so much loneliness? So that Christians also have a God who understands: "We do not have a high priest who is unable to feel sympathy for our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tested in every way, just as we are – yet he did not sin. Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need [e.g. loneliness]" (Hebrews 4:15-16).

Jesus Christ experienced loneliness in the past; he overcomes loneliness in the present; he will banish loneliness in the future. Let me leave you with a heart-warming passage from a brilliant old book called *Practical Religion* by J. C. Ryle (p.348):

'The Lord Jesus goes with His friends wherever they go. There is no possible separation between Him and those whom He loves. There is no place or position on earth, or under the earth, that can divide them from the great Friend of their souls. When the path of duty calls them far away from home, He is their companion; when they pass through the fire and water of fierce tribulation, He is with them; when they lie down on the bed of sickness, He stands by them and makes their trouble work for good; when they go down the valley of the shadow of death, and friends and relatives stand still and can go no further, He goes by their side. When they wake up in the unknown world of Paradise, they are still with Him; when they rise with a new body at the judgment day, they will not be alone. He will own them for His friends, and say, "They are mine: deliver them and let them go free." He will make good His own words: "I am with you always, even unto the end of the world" (Matt. 28:20).'

The wisdom of afternoon tea



My wife and I were at one time missionaries with the Overseas Missionary Fellowship. We joined them in 1975 after a period of training at their headquarters in London. While we were there, we met the hostess of the Mission Home, a matronly lady who had herself served overseas. She was a formidable person, but with a soft heart, and a depth of spiritual wisdom.

I remember her offering to our group of would-be missionaries this piece of sage advice: “The missionaries who stay the longest on the field are those who have their afternoon tea.” It struck me then as being very profound, and it is a life rule that I have followed ever since, with great benefits.

This practice of course is typically British, but valuable none the less. For us, a cup of tea is the answer to everything. “Let’s make a cup of tea,” we say in any crisis. It soothes and refreshes and helps us get things in perspective. Somehow things seem much brighter when you have had a cuppa, especially if shared with friends or colleagues.

But there is more to the custom of afternoon tea. This little ritual gives us permission to stop in the midst of a busy day and rest a while. It enables us to make contact with others, and to step back from whatever is filling our mind at the time. And over time, these little oases are the way we care for our souls as well as our bodies.

We read that Jesus, when He was tired, sat down by the well at Sychar (John 4:6). He gave Himself permission to stop and have a break. I like to think on that basis He would heartily approve of afternoon tea.

Brackley Food Bank beats Lockdown.

When all but four of the volunteers who run the Brackley Food Bank had to self-isolate, something drastic was needed if they were going to be able to carry on serving the town and its surrounding villages. The answer was there, in front of them; use email, smartphones and printer/scanners, and go online.

Posters were stuck up redirecting clients to a phone number. Volunteer delivery drivers were recruited, care professionals who issue vouchers were swiftly retrained, and the town council were informed. That was four weeks ago. “We’re still here” says the website blog (brackleyfoodbank.org, since you ask). Demand has risen threefold; giving has kept pace.

This crisis has brought out the best in a town which was already generous towards the food bank’s work. Three streets have already had collections, and there are two more in the pipeline. That is Brackley for you!

P.S. If, dear reader, if you are minded to give some food to us, remember there are collection points in Brackley Waitrose, High street Co-op and Croughton Co-op, and Unit 6 , Network 43, Buckingham Road, open from 12 till 2 Tuesdays and Thursdays.

31st May - Pentecost in Jerusalem

On that long ago first morning of Pentecost, Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for it was one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of Firstfruits, looking forward to the wheat harvest.

In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying. There was nothing else for them to do: Jesus had died, He had risen, and He had ascended, promising to send them ‘a Comforter’. They were left alone, to wait at Jerusalem. And so, they waited – on Him, and for Him.

They were not disappointed, for that morning the Holy Spirit fell upon that small room, and transformed those believers into the Church, Christ’s body here on earth. Pentecost was not the first time that the Holy Spirit came to the world – throughout the Old Testament there are stories telling of how God had guided people and given them strength. But now His Spirit would use a new instrument: not just isolated prophets, but the Church, His body on earth.

Acts opens with the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem, the centre of the Jewish nation. Within 30 years the Gospel had spread throughout the northern Mediterranean: Syria, Turkey, Greece, Malta... to the very heart of the Roman Empire: Rome. The Church was on the move – God was on the move! He was calling people from every nation to repent, turn to Jesus for forgiveness of their sins, and to follow Him.

Mum and Dad, did know best.....

Well, these days of isolation, lockdown or the new normal certainly give you time to think, or as those of you that know me reminisce.

My Mums constant "you are so wasteful" come ringing to my ears, but as a teenager or before, I would put it down to the monetary deprived childhood and early adult life she lived, especially during the second world war and in the early 50's, as a young housewife and mother. "Only one small squeeze of washing up liquid is all you need", "Do you really need ALL that butter on your toast?" "Don't throw that wrapping paper away, you might need it" Stockings, or tights as they became, could be repaired as could all items of clothing.

Mum used to get as much out of her lipstick as she could, always using a matchstick to get the last dregs out, and do you know I've started to do that, although I use a cotton bud, but I'm only using one until it cannot be used anymore. Likewise, her Crème Puff powder would go down to the very end, before she would agree she needed to buy more. Yes, I have started to meld the old bar of soap onto the new one, how I used to moan about that. How did she manage to keep the Tin Foil and Cling Film from wrapping itself around the edges, by patience of course?

Dad always made do and mended what ever he could and as a child I always helped him utilise what ever he could find. He would do all the decorating, electrical work and plumbing himself. As a small child I would help when he decoked the car engine. I had a long apprenticeship on every strand of his work and remember the day, when in my early twenties, I was allowed to hang my first piece of wallpaper.

In the months prior to his death we would talk and laugh about "The Good Old Times", but he often used to list the things I could do, cook, well not a good as Mum, too much of a hard act to follow, although I've always been better at laundry than her. I can sew, knit and repair things. I can "Do It Yourself" around the house, thanks to him, but one day he said "Beverly, I love you dearly and I am proud of you, but you just cannot do woodwork, you are unable even to hit a nail in straight"

Well Dad I had another joyful reason to shout hallelujah on Easter Sunday, as I nailed, yes all straight , trellis to the shed. Things are looking up.



Minutes of the Parochial Church Meeting Held on 2nd April 2020 via Zoom
Chair – Rev Rich Duncan Rich welcomed everyone and opened the meeting with prayer.

Approval of the Minutes The minutes of the meeting held on 2nd April 2020 were approved by Jacky Adams and John Carter. The minutes could not be signed by Rich as the meeting was via zoom.

Matters Arising The flag pole problem has been fixed and the flag of St George has been found.

Vicar's Business Due to the coronavirus the church has been closed until further notice. Rich will hold a video service at 9.30 on a Sunday morning. So far Rich has had 400 hits from people. As we have had so many people looking at the video we now need to think how we are going to further contact those people. Rich will look into it. Rich is now considering an online Alpha course. The APCM scheduled for April has been cancelled due to the Coronavirus.

Recruitment of a Children and Families Worker Rich received several applications. One applicant was interviewed by Rich and Val. It was felt they were not suitable for the position. Rich will re-advertise, but due to the Coronavirus if a suitable applicant can be found the start date at present would be unknown.

Coronavirus - Impact and Ideas The PCC discussed the possibility of setting up an Emergency Fund. Opinion was split. Rich to send round a proposal to vote on by email.

Correspondence None

Safeguarding - The C2 in-house training has been cancelled. The present situation gives those who have not yet completed C0 and C1 to do so by the next time PCC meets.

Finance Finances have been dominated by repair costs in the past couple of months but will increasingly suffer from low income levels in the next few months due to all church services having been cancelled.

Committee Reports - Deanery - no report received – Synod was cancelled.

Social Committee - Report sent to all PCC members. All fund raising activities cancelled.

Building, Development and Maintenance Good news is that the felt and battens on the extension are alright. This has saved us £1,000. The conditions of the remaining tiles is very poor and approximately in 10 years they will have to be replaced at a cost of about £150,000. When things get back to normal we may start to look at a way in which we can raise the necessary funds for this work to be carried out.

Health and Safety - Nothing to report.

Any other Business - It was agreed (1 against) that the Gardening team could continue to cut the grass in the church yard proving they observed the government guidelines.

The War Graves sign will be put up once it is safe to do so.


The meeting closed at 21.40 with prayer. Date of the next meeting 7th May 2020 via Zoom. There were 10 members in attendance with 1 apology.
